Since childhood, Lacey Schwartz knew she was different: her dark complexion set her apart from the rest of her family, as did her boisterous, black curls. But it wasn't until her freshman year at Georgetown University that she began to understand why. Growing up, her parents never spoke about her origins, and Schwartz had no reason to think of herself as anything but white. In Little White Lie, the filmmaker bravely pulls back the curtain on her family secrets, raising larger questions through the frank and sometimes raw conversations with family and friends. In this deeply personal and riveting exploration of bi-racial identity, Schwartz asks:

What makes us who we are? And how do we rebuild our identities after learning that the assumptions underlying them are false?

Filmmaker and star of Little White Lie, Lacey Schwartz, will be joining us after the film for a discussion and Q&A. Pastries from Sweet Street Desserts will be available for purchase after the film and all proceeds will be donated to the Central Pennsylvania African American Museum here in Reading.



MetaMaus presented by Pulitzer Prize-winning artist, illustrator and author **Art Spiegelman**

> Tuesday, April 21, 2015 7:30 PM at Wachovia Theatre, Albright College


This is a talk-with-images version of the MetaMaus book with—a focus on answering "why comics?" are the medium Art Spiegelman works in, showing historical and contemporary examples. Spiegelman takes on why the animal metaphor and racial caricature are at the heart of this genocidal project ("Why Mice?"); and talks about why his personal past—rather than, say, a desire to ride current cultural trends toward victim-culture and "holokitsch"—made Maus a necessary work.

The talk, like the book, ultimately concerns itself with the creative process: It's a plea for communication as an essential component of art (rather than the Modernist notion of the artist as shaman or the cynical devaluation of art as being just a rarefied form of commerce). This talk is entertaining as well as thought-provoking and moving.

David Brooks: On Character



Join New York Times columnist David Brooks for an in-depth discussion about what constitutes character, as explored in his new book, The Road to Depth. 

"The wonder and the grace of Alice Sommer Herz"

Sage, saint, mavin and subject of the best selling book "A Garden of Eden in Hell," Alice Sommer Herz was imprisoned in Theresienstadt and survived unspeakable atrocities. She was a pianist of distinction and it is no doubt that music saved both her sanity and her life.

She learned "to be grateful for everything, because life is beautiful and everything is a present." Alice Sommer Herz died in February at the age of 110, the world's oldest known Holocaust survivor. Share her inspiration and her "beautiful life." (1 hour)
